- e. If the signature count is between 449,861 and 549,831 then the Secretary of State notifies counties using the random sampling technique to determine validity of all signatures.

(If the Secretary of State notifies the counties to determine the number of qualified electors who have signed the petition on a date prior to 5/30/78, the last day is not later than the thirtieth day after the notification.)



Pursuant to the provisions of sections 3505 and 3513 of the Elections Code, you are hereby informed that on this day we mailed to Richard L. Mudgett, proponent, the following title and summary:

STATE FUNDING OF ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION - INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Requires full state funding by July 1, 1980 to provide equal educational opportunity for all students in grades kindergarten through twelve enrolled in accredited public or private schools of parents' choice. Provides for academic accreditation by commission established by Legislature. Schools so funded must admit students without regard to race, color, nationality, place of origin, or sex, with stated exception. Prohibits sectarian instruction in public but not in private schools. Prohibits use of public funds to support schools not under exclusive control of public school officials, unless specified conditions are met. Financial impact: If this initiative is adopted, it probably would result in a substantial but unknown cost increase.

EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE IX SECTION 5, 6, AND 8 AND ARTICLE XIII SECTION 21 OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE CONSTITUTION

Delete Section 5 of Article IX and add:

State Supported Equal Opportunity Education
Section 5

Every student in the kindergarten, elementary and secondary schools of California is entitled to an equal educational opportunity. The right to an equal educational opportunity shall not be affected by the wealth or poverty of the school district in which the person to whom the right is guaranteed resides, nor shall the right to an equal educational opportunity be abridged by the Legislature or by any agreement or contract entered into by any individual, school district, or the state.

By July 1, 1980, the Legislature shall establish and maintain an Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarship Fund sufficient to pay for the full cost of providing an equal educational opportunity for all kindergarten, elementary and secondary school students in California who are enrolled in any public school or in any private school qualified pursuant to Sections 5.1 thru 5.3 of this article.

Each student shall be entitled to a share of this Equal Educational Opportunity Fund which shall be equal except for variations deemed appropriate by the Legislature including, but not limited to, those based on age, curriculum and vocational education, area cost factors and educational need.

The parent, parents, guardian or guardians of a person eligible to utilize the Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarship Fund shall have the right, unrestricted by geographic or governmental boundaries, to choose which eligible public or eligible private school the eligible person may attend.

Student shares, herein to be known as Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships, shall be redeemable at all public schools and at those private schools in compliance with the provisions of Section 5.1 thru 5.3 of this article.

Schools owned and operated by public authorities shall herein be call Public Scholarship Schools. Private schools accepting scholarships under provisions of Sections 5.1 thru 5.3 of this article shall be subject to the provisions of Sections 5.1 thru 5.3 of this article, and shall be called Private Scholarship Schools. Collectively, these schools shall herein be referred to as Scholarship Schools. Scholarship schools shall maintain a minumum number of instructional days per year, to be fixed by the Legislature.

Accreditation of Public and Private Scholarship Schools
Section 5.1

Funds made available from the Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarship Fund may be expended only for the purposes of obtaining educational services from those Scholarship Schools whose academic programs are accredited by an accrediting commission established by the Legislature, membership of which shall include, but not be limited to, representatives of public and private education, business, labor and members of the public at large. The accrediting commission shall use the same accreditation standards for the academic programs of both public and private scholarship schools.

The full cost of the accredited program of instruction at eligible scholarship schools shall be paid with the Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarship presented to the school of attendance by the parent, parents, guardian, guardians and shall include, but is not limited to, the cost of books and all other educational aids and tools. No additional payment for the accredited program of instruction shall be required of the parent, parents, guardian or guardians of students attending public or private scholar p schools.

Enrollment in Scholarship Schools
Section 5.2

No person shall be denied enrollment in any school receiving Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships because of race, color, nationality, place of origin, or sex. Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships may be used at an eligible public or private scholarship school which traditionally has had a policy of admitting only students of one sex.

The Legislature shall set minimum attendance standards for pupils to remain qualified for Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships.

Testing and Information
Section 5.3

The Legislature shall establish a thorough and efficient system of information which shall fully inform the parent, parents, guardian or guardians of school age students, including nonliterate parents and guardians, concerning all relevant characteristics, including achievement data, of scholarship schools located within the geographical area from which the parent, parents, guardian or guardians may choose.

All schools receiving Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships shall post together in plain view, in their enrollment offices:

- a. Article IX Sections 5 thru 5.4 of the California State Constitution.
- b. The subject school's comparative standing on all basic academic subjects for each grade on a state and national level according to annually administered tests approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Funding for Transportation, Disabilities and Special Educational Needs
Section 5.4

The Legislature shall provide additional funds and student-certification requirements for special education, educational handicaps, disabilities and for transportation for students eligible to receive Equal Educational Opportunity Scholarships as deemed appropriate by the Legislature. These said additional funds shall be added to each certified pupil's basic scholarship. The Legislature shall ensure that Federal aid shall, within the limits of Federal law, be employed to advance the objectives of this article.

Delete paragraphs 3 and 4 of Section 6
