 - c. Last day for county to determine total number of signatures
affixed to petition and to transmit total to the Secretary of
State Friday, 8/27/82

(If the Proponent files the petition with the county on a date prior to 8/20/82, the county has five working days from the filing of the petition to determine the total number of signatures affixed to the petition and to transmit the total to the Secretary of State.) Elec. C., Sec. 3520(b).

+ **PLEASE NOTE:** To the Proponent who may wish to qualify for the 1982 General Election. The law allows up to 56 days to county election officials for checking and reporting petition signatures. The law also requires that this process be completed 131 days before the election in which the people will vote on the initiative. It is possible that the county may not need the whole 56 days. But if you want to be sure that this initiative qualifies for the 1982 General Election, you should file this petition with the county by April 29, 1982.

- d. Last day for county to determine total number of qualified electors who signed the petition, and to transmit certificate with a blank copy of the petition to the Secretary of State. Saturday, 9/11/82

(If the Secretary of State notifies the counties to determine the number of qualified electors who signed the petition on a date prior to 8/27/82, the last day is not later than the fifteenth day after the notification.)
Elec. C., Sec. 3520(d), (e).

- e. If the signature count is between 498,411 and 609,169 then the Secretary of State notifies the counties using the random sampling technique to determine the validity of all signatures.

Last day for county to determine actual number of all qualified electors who signed the petition, and to transmit certificate with a blank copy of the petition to the Secretary of State. Monday, 10/11/82

(If the Secretary of State notifies the counties to determine the number of qualified electors who have signed the petition on a date prior to 9/11/82, the last day is not later than the thirtieth day after the notification.)
Elec. C., Sec. 3521(b), (c).

4. Campaign Statements:

Last day for the Proponent to file a Campaign Statement of Receipts and Expenditures for period ending 9/17/82. Friday, 9/24/82


(If the Secretary of State finds that the measure has either qualified or failed to qualify on a date earlier than 8/20/82, the last date to file is the 35th calendar day after the deadline for filing petitions or the date of notification by the Secretary of State that the measure has either qualified or failed to qualify, whichever is earlier. The closing date for the campaign statement is seven days prior to the filing deadline.)

The Attorney General of California has prepared the following title and summary of the chief purpose and points of the proposed measure:

LOTTERIES. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Amends California Constitution to require legislature to provide for a state-operated lottery in which net proceeds are allocated exclusively for the benefit of Senior Programs, Youth Scholarship Programs, and Veteran Programs. Defines these programs. Establishes ex officio committee responsible for allocation of specified percentages of net lottery proceeds to each program. Requires legislative appropriations to these programs, including lottery proceeds, of no less than 1980-81 appropriations plus cost of living increases. Requires establishment of Lottery Commission funded from lottery proceeds to administer the lottery. Specifies percentages of lottery gross proceeds usable for prize and administration expenses. Summary of estimate by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local governments: There would be no net increase in state General Fund revenues from adoption of this measure. There would be reductions in existing state expenditures because lottery revenues would replace existing state support for three specified programs. If net lottery revenues exceed total expenditures of these three programs, additional revenues would be used to increase their level of support. Future expenditure increases, tied to the growth in the Consumer Price Index, are mandated for the three programs. If annual growth in lottery revenues is sufficient to fund these expenditure increases, there would be no net impact on General Fund expenditures. If annual growth in lottery revenues falls below the mandated increases in expenditures, this measure would result in unknown increases in state General Fund costs.

INITIATIVE MEASURE TO BE SUBMITTED DIRECTLY TO THE VOTERS

The Attorney General of California has prepared the following title and summary of the chief purpose and points of the proposed measure:

TO THE HONORABLE SECRETARY OF STATE OF CALIFORNIA

We, the undersigned, registered, qualified voters of California, residents of _____ County (or City and County), hereby propose amendments to the Constitution of California, the Business and Professions Code, the Government Code, and the Penal Code, relating to lotteries, and petition the Secretary of State to submit the same to the voters of California for their adoption or rejection at the next succeeding general election or at any special statewide election prior to that general election or otherwise as provided by law. The proposed amendments read as follows:

That Section 19 of Article IV of the California Constitution is amended to read:

SEC. 19. (a) Except as provided in subdivisions (c) and (d), the Legislature has no power to authorize lotteries and shall prohibit the sale of lottery tickets in the State.

(b) The Legislature may provide for the regulation of horse races and horse race meetings and wagering on the results.

(c) The Legislature by statute may authorize cities and counties to provide for bingo games, but only for charitable purposes.

(d) The Legislature shall provide for a state-operated lottery in which the net proceeds are allocated exclusively for the benefit of the following: 1) Senior Programs; 2) Youth Scholarship Programs; and 3) Veteran Programs. The amount of money which may be used for prizes shall not exceed 50 percent and operating expenses, including costs of administration, shall not exceed 10 percent of the gross proceeds of the lottery. The Legislature shall not appropriate less money in any year to Senior Programs, Youth Scholarship Programs, and Veteran Programs, including the lottery, than the amount appropriated in the 1980-81 fiscal year plus an amount proportional to the increase in the cost of living, as measured by the Consumer Price Index or its successors index as reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor, since the 1980-81 fiscal year.

The Legislature shall create a committee consisting of the Governor, State Treasurer, Controller, Director of State Department of Aging, Director of the Student Aid Commission, and Director of State Department of Veterans Affairs to be responsible for allocation of net proceeds to said programs in the following proportions: 30% to Senior Programs; 40% to Youth Scholarship Programs, and 30% to Veteran Programs.

The Legislature shall establish a State Lottery Commission fully funded through the State Lottery to administer the program and assist the Committee in the performance of their duties. The Commission shall consist of three (3) members who shall serve for six (6) year terms and shall be appointed by the Governor.

For the purpose of this subsection (d):

- a) "Senior Programs" means those programs administered by the California State Department of Aging and any other Senior Program(s), as determined by the Director of the Department of Aging.

- b) "Youth Scholarship Programs" means those programs administered by the California Student Aid Commission and any other Youth Scholarship Program(s) as determined by the Director of the Student Aid Commission.

- c) "Veteran Programs" means those programs administered by the California State Department of Veterans Affairs and any other Veteran Program(s) as determined by the Director of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

The Provisions of this Act shall become operative at 12:01 AM on January 1, 1983.
