+ PLEASE NOTE: To the Proponent who may wish to qualify for the 1986 General Election. The law allows approximately 67 days for county election officials to check and report petition signatures and transmit results. The law also requires that this process be completed 131 days before the election in which the people will vote on the initiative. It is possible that the county may not need precisely 67 days. But if you want to be sure that this initiative qualifies for the 1986 General Election, you should file this petition with the county before April 18, 1986.

d. Secretary of State determines whether the total number of signatures filed with all county clerks meets the minimum number of required signatures, and notifies the counties..... Sunday, 8/31/86**

e. Last day for county to determine total number of qualified voters who signed the petition, and to transmit certificate with a blank copy of the petition to the Secretary of State..... Monday, 9/15/86

(If the Secretary of State notifies the county to determine the number of qualified voters who signed the petition on a date other than 8/25/86, the last day is not later than the fifteenth day after the county's receipt of notification.)

f. If the signature count is more than 693,149 or less than 567,123, then the Secretary of State certifies the petition has qualified or failed, and notifies the counties. If the signature count is between 567,123 and 693,149 inclusive, then the Secretary of State notifies the counties using the random sampling technique to determine the validity of all signatures..... Sunday, 9/21/86**

g. Last day for county to determine actual number of all qualified voters who signed the petition, and to transmit certificate with a blank copy of the petition to the Secretary of State..... Tuesday, 10/21/86



The Attorney General of California has prepared the following title and summary of the chief purpose and points of the proposed measure:

PROHIBITION OF PUBLIC FUNDING FOR TERMINATION OF HUMAN LIFE
AFTER FERTILIZATION. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

Adds the following underlined words to the California

Constitution: "Notwithstanding any other provision of the California Constitution or any state court decision, money may be drawn from the Treasury only through an appropriation made by law and upon a Controller's duly drawn warrant. No public money shall be spent directly or indirectly for the killing of innocent human individuals from fertilization until natural death." Summary of estimate by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local governments: Assuming that key social characteristics do not change, the net effect of this measure would be to increase state and local government costs as the estimated cost of increased welfare and disabled children programs will exceed the estimated savings from not spending public funds for therapeutic abortions funded through Medi-Cal or county health programs or funded through public employees health benefit programs. The increased costs would be a minimum of \$1 million annually, once the effect of the measure is fully realized. In subsequent years, net costs would increase substantially.

"Article 16, Section 7, of the California Constitution is amended to read as follows:

Notwithstanding any other provision of the California Constitution or any state court decision, money may be drawn from the Treasury only through an appropriation made by law and upon a Controller's duly drawn warrant. No public money shall be spent directly or indirectly for the killing of innocent human individuals from fertilization until natural death."

TWO MORE INITIATIVES ENTER CIRCULATION, REPORTS EU

SACRAMENTO — Two new initiatives have joined the nineteen already in circulation Secretary of State March Fong Eu announced today (Mar. 20).

Susan Sassone of the Santa Ana-based group, Choose Life, is making a second attempt to qualify "Prohibition of Public Funding for Termination of Human Life After Fertilization." This measure would amend the constitution to read, "Notwithstanding any other provision of the California Constitution or any state court decision, money may be drawn from the Treasury only through an appropriation made by law and upon a Controller's duly drawn warrant. No public money shall be spent directly or indirectly for the killing of innocent human individuals from fertilization until natural death."

In the first attempt begun in Sept. 1985, proponent Sassone failed to collect the required 630,136 signatures during the 150 days allowed by law for circulation of petitions. In order to qualify the current proposal for the ballot, she must submit the same number of signatures by Aug. 18.

Gerald Ronnebeck of Adelanto is heading the 26th attempt to legalize casino style gaming in California. Calling it the "Anti-Gambling Proliferation Amendment," he has proposed a constitutional amendment that would prohibit all forms of commercial gambling in the state except in four specific zones: Adelanto, Blythe, Los Banos, and Bakersfield. The measure would establish a seven-member Gambling Commission to regulate games of chance involving cards, dice, lotteries, racing and "other gambling means and devices" within the zones. It would have the authority "....to sell licenses and permits to establish fees, and to set renewal periods." Forty percent of the proceeds from the gaming

would go to aid the elderly, 20% for scientific research through the UC system, 20% to the state general fund, and 20% to be shared by the cities/counties in the zones.

This measure is also a constitutional amendment requiring 630,136 signatures by Aug. 18 to qualify for the ballot. However, measures headed for the November ballot must be qualified and certified by June 26.

We were unable to locate a telephone number for proponent Ronnebeck.

Copies of the initiatives, their titles and summaries and circulation and calendars are attached.

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
